Exploring ethos

CSSC's working group continues to look at the ethos of the controlled education sector.

As part of this work, a conference on 22 March provided an opportunity for Principals to explore ethos and how it applies to their own school.

Key note speaker Dave Thompson encouraged delegates to examine why ethos matters and the contribution Governors can make to the ethos of a school.



Those in attendance shared best practise and addressed questions to Key note speaker Gareth Hetherington discussed the 'Skills a panel of peers from all school phases within the controlled sector. Barometer' and forecasting future demands for skills in the work force.

Participants considered ways in which CSSC can provide support for schools in relation to ethos and this input will be used in developing an ethos toolkit for controlled schools.

Over 50 delegates from schools across Northern Ireland attended CSSC's raising standards conference on 28 February, which was delivered in partnership with the Education Authority.





The event explored how school leaders can connect theory and practice to raise standards in schools.

The importance of collaboration for improved educational outcomes emerged as a key theme of the event.

The panellists included Maria Quinn, Abbey Community College; Michelle Rainey, Ballyclare High School; Heather Murray, Millington Primary School; Gillian Dunlop, Largymore Primary School; and Grace Trimble, Kilkeel Nursery School.

Outcomes from the event included encouraging participants to Lean In and set up their own peer support networks. CSSC will look at what further events it could facilitate to meet the needs identified.

Permanent Secretary, Derek Baker, launched CSSC's €140k Erasmus+ project on 9 January at partner-school Kilcooley PS. The project is funded by the European Union via the British Council.

Bangor Academy is also involved, alongside international partners from Scotland, the Republic of Ireland, Denmark and Finland. The two-year project focuses on teaching problem-solving in technology rich environments, and will conclude with an international conference in Northern Ireland in 2019.



Killicomaine Junior High School was recently awarded a second place 'highly commended' in the Youth Sports Trust awards 'Best Secondary School of the Year' for its outstanding contribution to the Girls Active programme.

This terrific achievement was led by PE teacher Mrs Hillis and six students called the GLAM girls, who aim to get more girls active.



Castlederg High School was placed 5th in the non-grammar GCSE league table published by The Irish News on Monday 19 February.

The school's 2017 GCSE exam results, in which 83% of pupils achieved 5 or more A*-C grades, including Maths and English, were 36% above the Northern Ireland average for schools of a similar type.

CSSC understands that when it comes to reported league tables it is difficult to compare like with like and great care must be taken to not undermine the quality teaching that is taking place in all schools.
