
The training took place from 18-20 February 2019 and was delivered by Peter Ahlroos from Vamia who provided the team with an excellent learning experience.

The project team, under Peter's expert tutelage, explored the use of Screencast-O Matic, QR codes, iMovie, Inkflow, Powtoon, 360° cameras and H5P to create, edit and share interactive movies that could be used to stimulate learners' curiosity and engage them in problem solving and problem posing activities in mathematics.

Participants reflected on how the different technologies may be used by the teacher and also by the learners themselves.

The project team will use their new knowledge and skills to produce several resources for problem solving in mathematics, which will be available for download from this website in the future.

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Dickson schools moving forward with MoU

Principals from the Dickson school have had a series of meetings since June 2018 to develop and enhance ways of collaborating to improve outcomes for pupils.

Facilitated by the Controlled Schools' Support Council and the Education Authority, all seven Dickson schools have been involved in terms of identifying how they might work more effectively together, which has culminated in the creation of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

The MoU sets out the roles and responsibilities of all the Dickson schools to enhance the opportunities for those involved in the Dickson System to collaborate on important areas such as teacher professional learning and structured induction for pupils in their transition from junior to senior schools.

MPs hear from CSSC reps

Local school leaders were given the opportunity to meet with MPs about education funding on Monday 28 January in Holy Cross College, Strabane, at a roundtable discussion hosted by the Northern Ireland Affairs Committee.

CSSC representatives Grace Trimble, Principal of Kilkeel Nursery School, Raymond McFeeters, Principal of Castle Tower School and Ardnashee School and College, and Banbridge Academy Principal Robin McLoughlin, attended the event and spoke on behalf of the sector. Barry Mulholland and Sara McCracken were also in attendance.

The opportunity was taken to further highlight the ongoing concerns over the shortfall in the education budget.

Following the roundtable discussion, CSSC submitted additional information to the inquiry into education finance.



Commitment to collaborate

CSSC and Stranmillis University College (SUC) have signed a joint Memorandum of Understanding which will see a strengthening of the relationship and further collaboration between the two organisations.

"CSSC and Stranmillis have already forged a good working relationship, and this MoU confirms that the organisations will continue to work together in the best interests of all controlled schools in Northern Ireland," said Barry Mulholland, CSSC Chief Executive.

Controlled school leaders from across Northern Ireland came together as part of an event focusing on building resilience.

The event, co-hosted by the Controlled Schools' Support Council (CSSC) and the Education Authority (EA), took place on Friday 8 March 2019. We were delighted that Sara Long, CE designate of EA opened the event.

A panel discussion featured serving school leaders Ruth Harkness, Craigavon Senior High School, Emma Quinn, Rathcoole Primary School, Andrew Armstrong, Dromara Primary School and Diane Morrow, mTech Academy. They delved into what challenges school leaders face and how they maintain and build their resilience.

This was followed by a session with facilitator Billy Dixon, who gave a practical and interactive presentation based on research and personal experience.

Great learning comes from great teaching

Well-known coach and mentor Stephen Harrison outlined how 'good leaders make great teachers'.

Celia O'Hagan, Senior Lecturer in Education at Stranmillis University College is a selfconfessed whole school improvement activist,

Hot topic sessions enabled controlled school principals to discuss subjects such as curriculum monitoring and manging difficult scenarios.
